The debate kicked off with Cardinal Langley taking the opposing side, they argued that copyright protections are essential to safeguarding the rights of artists, ensuring they receive fair compensation for their creative efforts. By allowing copyright to exist, they contended, artists are incentivised to continue producing new and innovative work, contributing to the cultural landscape. Bolton School Girls' Division, as the proposition, stood their ground with an equally passionate rebuttal. advocating that the current framework of copyright stifles creativity and innovation in the music industry. Throughout the debate, both teams displayed impressive eloquence and tactical skill, with both Cardinal Langley and Bolton School Girls' Division delivering powerful counterargument and rebuttals. In the end, despite Cardinal Langley's stellar performance, the judges ruled in favour of Bolton School Girls' Division, granting them the win in this closely contested round. However, the narrow margin underscored the strength of the opposition's arguments, and the Bolton Town Hall audience was left in awe of the talent and passion both teams brought to the stage.

Computer Musuem

A group of Year 9 students recently had the exciting opportunity to visit the Northwest Computer Museum, where they explored the evolution of technology and honed their coding skills in a hands-on environment. The visit was a fantastic blend of history, innovation, and interactive learning, allowing students to gain a deeper appreciation for how computers have shaped the modern world.

The visit began with a coding session using the programming language BASIC on vintage PCs. For many students, this was an opportunity to enhance their experience with textbased coding, providing valuable insight into how early programmers developed software. By writing simple programs and debugging their own code, students gained fundamental programming skills that they can now apply in their computing lessons back at school. This session reinforced key computational thinking principles, such as logic, sequencing, and problem-solving—essential skills for any budding programmer.

Following the coding workshop, students embarked on a guided tour of the museum, tracing the fascinating development of computers from their earliest forms to modern innovations. The tour covered everything from the first home computers, such as the first Apple computer and ZX Spectrums, to the rise of personal computing in the 1980s and the latest advancements in virtual reality (VR). Students were particularly intrigued by the evolution of storage media, from cassette tapes and floppy disks to the cloud-based storage we rely on today. 





